Why do you observe the splinter?

The message of this Sunday's Gospel (Luke 6:39-45) can perhaps be summarised by the line: "Why do you observe the splinter in your brother's eye and never notice the plank in your own?"



In our dealings with others, we can all do better, and often the "doing better", starts with the ability to realise the shortcomings in ourselves. We can only improve by NOT smugly feel we are perfect, and that everyone else is not! This wisdom was also uttered by the Greek philosopher Socrates. He advised us to learn to know ourselves (In Greek: $\gamma\nu\tilde{\omega}\theta\iota$ $\sigma\epsilon\alpha\nu\tau\acute{\omega}\nu$). He even expounded it to say: ""The unexamined life is not worth living". Few of us do enough of the exercise to get to know ourselves. The journey to know oneself is necessary if we want to be holy, and perhaps live a life less irritated by other people and circumstances or always have a critical spirit to put down others. Knowing ourselves, with our own shortcomings and failures, make us more humble and less quick to decry another person's faults. Blessings, Fr Michael

THE SEASON OF LENT

We enter the season of Lent this Ash Wednesday

+ **9.00am Mass Amberley** (note change of time, not 7.00am)



- + 7.00pm Mass Culverden
- + 7.30pm Ecumenical Service, Cheviot (Note, in St Anthony's Catholic Church, but led my Anglican Minister)

In light of the Omicron transmission in the community, the Apostolic Administrator expressed a preference that priests do not impose ashes on the forehead, and to consider giving people the option to administer the ashes on themselves at the end of Mass. Fr Michael will impose ashes to those who wishes him to do so. Those who feel venerable, can do so themselves at the end of Mass.

While one of the aims of the Season of Lent is the interior conversion of the heart, we nevertheless express our penitential mood through external concrete signs and gestures. Some of these external signs are expressed in our liturgies and through the change in appearance in our churches.

There is definitely a starkness in our liturgies for Sundays and weekdays. Some of the things that would be evident include:

- † The liturgical colour of purple, the same as that for a funeral;
- † The 'Gloria' is neither said nor sung, and there is no incidental music the only music is to support singing;
- † The disappearance of the word 'Alleluia' (which will re-emerge with great intensity on the Easter Vigil celebrations);
- † There are no flower decorations in the Church;
- † People leave the church in silence, at the end of Mass, in keeping with the penitential mood. This is part of our 'Fasting'.

These external signs set the tone for our Lenten Season, paving the way towards the Holy Week celebrations.

Apart from the above, there are also many concrete exercises that help us to actively participate in the Lenten spirit:

- Stations of the Cross, particularly on Fridays. In Amberley at 5:30pm, Fr Michael will lead it next Friday, and hope there are parishioners who can lead them on other Fridays, or in our other churches. He has several settings/reflections which he can provide just ask him.
- More opportunities to go to *Confession*, as we approach Holy Week.
- *Alms Giving* Envelopes are available on the pews for donations for projects (by Caritas) that promote social justice and peace.

There are of course, many other ways of seeking internal conversion of the heart, and the Church very much encourages us to take our own initiative in finding ways, befitting of our circumstances, to pray, fast and give alms.
