You cannot be slave of both and money

In the Gospel (Luke 16:1-13, or 16:10-13), we read of the steward, or an 'employee', who lost his job because he squandered the goods and talents entrusted to him by his master. Before news of his dismissal becomes public, he strikes a deal with his master's debtor, to win favour from them.

At first glance, Our Lord seems to praise the steward for

his dishonesty, but on closer observation, we find that the steward is actually being commended for his shrewdness. He grasps his critical situation and acts with foresight, with vision.

The parable emphasises a single point; that we should be shrewd enough to make proper use of our worldly wealth, while we still have time, for our eternal salvation. Our Lord says (verse 9); "...use money, tainted as it is, to win friends, and thus makes sure that when it fails you, they will welcome you in the tents of eternity". In simple language it would be something like; '...use wisely, the wealth entrusted to you, and secure your salvation in the eternal Kingdom of God'. Our Lord's concern is that we spend as much foresight and energy on spiritual matters, which have eternal consequences, as we do with earthly wealth which only have earthly consequences. He ends his parable so eloquently with the words: "No servant can be the slave of two masters... You cannot be the slave both of God and money". God bless Fr Michael

FEAST DAY OF THE WEEK

23 September: St Pio of Pietrelcina (1887-1968).

He was born in the small village of Pietrelcina in southern Italy, and joined the Capuchin friars at the age of 16. He became a priest seven years later, and spent fifty years at the monastery of San Giovanni Rotondo, where he was very much sought after as a spiritual advisor, confessor, and intercessor. Many miracles were popularly ascribed to him during his lifetime. He died a few days after the fiftieth anniversary of his receiving the stigmata, and over 100,000 people attended his funeral.

MAORI LANGUAGE WEEK

New Zealand has its very own language, Māori! Along with English and NZSL (New Zealand Sign Language), te reo Māori is has been an official language of Aotearoa since 1987. Every year



Māori Language Week is held to promote the indigenous language and celebrate the culture. Kiwis are encouraged to learn some te reo Māori and are given the chance to experience the culture with events scheduled around the country.

Did you know that certain Maori phrases used in the Catholic Church of Aotearoa New Zealand are specific to our use, and differ from those translations in other Maori-English translation?
