He who humbles himself will be exalted

Reading the Gospels, it is easy to think of the Pharisees as the 'baddies' in the Gospels, especially in the references to their antics Our Lord made in His teachings. Thinking that way would do them a disservice, for their goal was often to lead a holy life (not unlike us), and to love strictly according to the Law of Moses. Where they usually went wrong could be summarised under these headings;

- exaggerated focus on the externals,
- interpreting Scriptures to suit the situation, and
- having a sense of self-righteousness that saw themselves being 'better' than others.

These are the same areas against which Our Lord frequently and fiercely attacked. Sometimes the attitude

we adopt are not too different from them! It is only when we begin to see our own sinfulness and our own weakness that we realised we need to be saved. After all, God came to us as a Saviour: to save us from our sins. The path to holiness must begin with the realisation of our own brokenness. In relation to this realisation, this Sunday's (Luke 18:9-14) Gospel invites us to examine again how we pray, and how we see each other before God. The Pharisees prayed with a certain smugness, while the tax collector with a certain humility, conscious of his sinfulness. It is the prayer and attitude of the Tax Collector that is the example for us to follow: "God me merciful on me a sinner".

SAINTS OF THE WEEK

28 October: Sts Simon and Jude, Apostles. There are not many references to Saints Simon and Jude in the Gospels, thus nothing is known of either of them with any certainty. As Apostles, however, we know with certainty that they were key actors in laying the deep foundations of the Church.

Biblically, Saint Jude was often confused with Judas Iscariot, the one who betrayed Jesus! Indeed the tradition of calling him "Jude" rather than the Scriptural "Judas" is likely to be part of the attempt to avoid such confusion (We find a similar attempt in John 14;22 to distinguish the two Judases when it was clarified that he was Judas but "not Iscariot"). He is probably assigned as the Patron Saint of Hopeless Causes, because of the faithful's reluctance to seek the intercession of one whose misfortune it was to share a name with Christ's betrayer - i.e. Jude is the saint to turn to as a last resort!!

Saint Simon the Apostle is called the "Zealot" in Saint Luke's Gospel. This may describe his zeal for the house of the Lord or denote his membership in a radical Jewish sect. He is the patron saint of tanners.
